1. SCOPE OF WORK

Safe work procedures for the installation of interconnected smoke alarms, heat alarms, and fire detection systems in residential and commercial buildings per AS 3786 and the relevant state legislation.

High Risk Construction Work (s.291): Electrical Work

Regulatory Reference: WHS Reg 2011, Reg 147 (electrical work)

2. SITE-SPECIFIC CONSIDERATIONS

The PCBU must assess and document site-specific factors before commencing work. Considerations include but are not limited to:

- Site access and egress routes
- Underground services (gas, water, electrical, telecommunications)
- Overhead power lines and obstructions
- Adjacent activities and interface risks
- Weather conditions and environmental factors
- Emergency routes and assembly points

3. TASK STEPS, HAZARDS & CONTROL MEASURES

■ Control measures follow the Hierarchy of Controls per WHS Reg 2011, Reg 36: Elimination → Substitution → Engineering → Administrative → PPE. Risk ratings use a 5x5 matrix aligned with AS/NZS ISO 31000:2009

5. REQUIRED LICENCES & COMPETENCIES

- Construction Induction Card (White Card) — required for all construction work under WHS Reg s.317; recognised in all states and territories
- Electrician's licence issued by your state or territory regulator (restricted electrical licence where the work is limited in scope)
- ARC Refrigerant Handling Licence (ARCTick) for any work that risks refrigerant emission from refrigeration or air-conditioning equipment
- Verify current licence and competency requirements with your state or territory WHS regulator before commencing work.

6. TOOLS, EQUIPMENT & PLANT

- Platform ladder to AS/NZS 1892.1
- Calibrated voltage tester
- Lock-out/tag-out kit
- Smoke alarm test aerosol
- Insulated tool set

All equipment must be inspected before use. Defective equipment must not be used.

10. MONITORING & REVIEW PROCEDURES
